Interregnum services

As you will know we currently have no Rector and as a result the number and pattern of our services must inevitably change. During this period (known as an Interregnum) our communion services will be taken by a number of priests from elsewhere who have kindly offered to give their time, while the non-communion services will be led by members of the Lay Band.

The Benefice Council has spent a considerable amount of time devising a pattern of services which it hopes will prove satisfactory and tries to take account of parish preferences and of the availability of service leaders. The pattern is that which is laid out on the service grid opposite. All being well that will be a consistent pattern for the duration of the interregnum - and it's anybody's guess how long that will be.

You will see that the most obvious change is that we will now have a United Benefice Service on the third Sunday of each month, with the venue rotating around our 5 parishes. On the other 3 Sundays the services will be as shown in the grid. When there is a 5th. Sunday that will also be a UBS.

We have also reverted to taking the Readings from the CofE Lectionary for 2024.

There may be changes in the service pattern from time to time due to things such as illness so please keep a careful eye on the Link to take account of that, and if in doubt consult your churchwardens.

PASTORAL LETTER

Pompeii's ruins or a warm welcome?

Are you good at remembering anniversaries? Maybe you missed this one: It

was 276 years ago this month since the ruins of Pompeii were rediscovered by Spanish engineer Rocque Joaquin de Alcubierre and his team. As any school pupil will remember, the city had been buried under millions of tonnes of volcanic ash

after Mount Vesuvius erupted in 79 AD. Happy anniversary to the archaeologists.

I remember a group of tourists coming into church before evensong. They looked around with interest at the ancient stones and memorials, the stained glass windows and the old brass lectern. Then one of them approached me and said, "Excuse me. Is this place still used?" Looking around at the ancient stones, I think the tourist felt like Rocque Joaquin de Alcubierre – he had just discovered archaeological evidence of a parish church! The church was actually very active and the group happily stayed to negotiate the perils of evensong.

I wonder what people think when they visit our churches. Hopefully your

church is open to visitors. Simon Jenkins commented that a church that is closed except for an hour on Sunday has become the meeting place of a sect. True. I know that he doesn't have to

maintain them or insure them, but our churches are for all in the parish and beyond and so should (wherever possible) be open and welcoming. I love it when I see a board outside, swinging in the breeze, that says

'Welcome! Church Open'. That is only bettered by 'Welcome! Church Open. Coffee and cake being served.'

Generally, people make up their minds within a few seconds when they walk into a church. Is this for me? So here's the friendly challenge: Is your church an archaeological heap to be discovered or a warm and welcoming community?

Pots & Plans: what to do in your garden this May

Gardens change quickly in May with new growth and new plants. Below are my go-to priorities for this month.

Tough love

Many indoor-grown plants come outside in May, but need toughening up first.

Plants don't like moving from a warm cosy windowsill, greenhouse, or garden centre. So it's important to acclimatise your plants to outdoor chills. Moving plants too fast is stressful and can stop growth.

Acclimatise your plants by moving them outside during the day and back indoors at night. Ideally for two weeks. Or if this isn't practical, you can 'harden-off' plants by opening nearby windows during the day. Or by moving plants outside, but then covering and uncovering plants with horticultural fleece, side-opening tunnel cloches, or a 'cold frame'.

This approach works well for summer bedding plants, tomatoes, courgettes, dahlias, and other frost-sensitive plants.

Watch your plants for signs that the change in growing conditions is too sudden and causing damage, such as yellowing leaves, wilting, browning of leaf margins, and slow (if any) growth.

Service containers

There's one... and another. Now's the time to roundup your garden containers to refresh them before new planting.

Many people have a collection of semi-permanent containers made from terracotta, plastic, stone, or wood. All benefit from a reset to keep long-term plants happy and prepare containers for summer bedding flowers.

Start with repairs or replacements. Then check your drainage holes are clear (and you have enough - at least five per square foot). Adding little feet helps drainage.

- For containers with permanant plants -remove weeds and replace the top 1-2 inches of compost with new peat-free multi-purpose compost.
- For containers wih no existing plants if they were filled with 100% compost last year, the refill with a 50:50 blend of topsoil and peat-free multi-purpose compst (or buy a pre-mix from a garden centre). If your containers already have a soil/compost blend, replace the first 1-2 inches and mix in.

Life is better shared

Like us, plants like company. While too much company is unwelcome, from nosy weeds for example, the right company will improve your plant health.

Many pests and diseases find it harder to take over when there's a diversity of plants and their related wildlife (and soil-life). So it's worth mixing up plants to avoid large monocultures.

One easy way is boost biodiversity is to grow annual flowers between fruit and veg. The flowers will tempt beneficial ladybirds, lacewings, and hoverflies, as well as 'parasitoids'. Simple-shaped flowers work the best.

Right, I'm off to cuddle my bedding plants. My best wishes to you and your garden.




