

Pots & Plans: what to do in your garden this May

Go, go, go

It's every trowel at the ready for planting summer bedding plants. Favourites such as cosmos, marigolds, petunias, and other 'frost sensitive' plants can be planted into borders and containers after mid-May. So can tomatoes, courgettes, runner beans, and similar vegetables that are started off inside.

Prepare your soil by removing weeds, or if your soil is compacted, lightly turn over with small fork or spade. Add a little compost to each planting hole and water plants before and afterwards to make sure the water really gets down to the roots.

To prepare containers - if they're mostly filled with topsoil or have permanent plants in, then you can usually refresh the soil for bedding plants. Just mix in compost to the top few inches and sprinkle in an organic fertiliser. But if your containers are mostly filled with purer compost from last year, it's best to start your containers afresh with new compost, or an 80:20 topsoil:compost mix for better longer-term growth.

I find that bedding and vegetable plants look rather dinky when first planted, so it's tempting to plant them rather close. But summer plants grow quickly once let loose, so follow instructions for spacing to avoid problems from overcrowding in summer. Usually plants are positioned 6 or 12 inches apart.

Stop, stop, stop

I did say it's planting time for indoor-grown veg and flowers, although check the weather! Delay planting if frost is still likely, or cover anything newly planted with horticultural fleece if the temperatures take a downward turn.

It's also useful to ' harden off' indoor grown plants before planting them outside. Plants don't like moving from a warm cosy windowsill, greenhouse, or garden centre. So it's important to acclimatise your plants to outdoor chills. Moving plants too fast is stressful and can stop growth. Acclimatise your plants by moving them outside during the day and back indoors at night. Ideally for two weeks. Or move plants outside into a cold frame or under horticultural fleece or side-opening tunnel cloche, and then uncover plants during the day and recover each night.

Watch your plants for any signs that the change in growing conditions is too sudden and causing damage, such as yellowing leaves, wilting, browning of leaf margins, and slow (if any) growth.

Stake, stake, stake

Some energetic plants wobble over summer when flowering, such as taller delphiniums, hollyhock, lupin. Plus taller varieties of aster, dahlia, and similar perennials. Now's the time to add stakes for best impact later in the year. Adding stakes now is also easier as the soil is softer for pushing them in.

Regularly tie flowering shoots to individual sticks or bamboo stakes. Or use 'grow through' plant supports which cover the whole plant and support shoots as they get taller. This also looks nicer in summer as plants have growth through their supports rather than have them imposed on later. Right, I'm off to do some weeding and remove mischievous slugs eying up my lettuce.

My best wishes to you and your garden.

Council Update

The Council met on the 7^{h} April. As well as the standard agenda items, updates were discussed on the ongoing flood prevention issue, the forthcoming council elections and an exciting initiative to refurbish the village bus shelter.

The Parish Council was delighted to support the initiative, proposed by Newnham History Society, to **renovate the old bus shelter on The Green**. Little, if any money has been spent on the bus shelter for many years, and the hope is that the refurbishment will provide a focal point of interest for visitors to the village. The History Society has designed and commissioned two information boards for the inside, depict ing "Royal Celebrations in Newnham 1837 to 2023" and "Newnham at War". The Parish Council would like to thank the History Society for helping to create a community asset for the village.

The Parish Council has also been discussing **how to improve communication in the village** so that residents feel informed about what is happening. Currently, news about village events and organisations is shared through the new village website (<u>www.newnhamvillage.co.uk</u>) and on Newnham Community Facebook page. For those not online, some events are publicised through posters on telegraph poles around the village and in the monthly Link publication. To find out how residents prefer to find out what is going on, the Parish Council will be calling on all households to survey your views. More details will be shared in the coming months.

Discussions have continued in relation to **flood prevention in the village**, with a general consensus that any works need to recognise all the potential flood points to avoid simply moving the flood water downstream or downhill and increasing risks to other properties. The Working Group is ordering sandbags and liaising with West Northants Council to produce a strategic solution.

The Parish Council, together with local volunteers, recently attended a meeting with the Woodland Trust to discuss the management plan for **The Nuttery**. This ancient site at the bottom of Manor Lane has a detailed management plan which is sensitive to the historically significant hazel plantation and the snowdrops planted there. The Woodland Trust suggested trialling some limited coppicing and thinning of the hazels to monitor which approach is the most effective in maintaining this important site.

There are some significant events coming up in the village. On**Sunday 4th May**, gardens around the village will be opened to visitors as part of the **National Open Gardens Scheme**. On **Thursday 8th May**, the village will mark the **80th Anniversary of VE Day by lighting a beacon** at the top of Walkers Hill. To conclude VE Day anniversary celebrations there will be a**party on the green on 10th May** with stalls, games, food and music. Tickets are available from <u>Judithdorkins@btinternet.com</u>. Huge thanks to Judith and her team for organising the events – fingers crossed for the weather!

The Local Elections taking place on 1st May apply to the Parish Council as well as West Northants Council. All Parish Councillors have to stand for re-election. However, because the number of Councillors standing do not exceed the eight places we have, there will not be a contested election.

The Annual Parish Meeting will take place on 28th May, at 19.00 in the Village Hall. The next Parish Council Meeting is Monday 12th May, starting at 7.00pm in the Village Hall.
